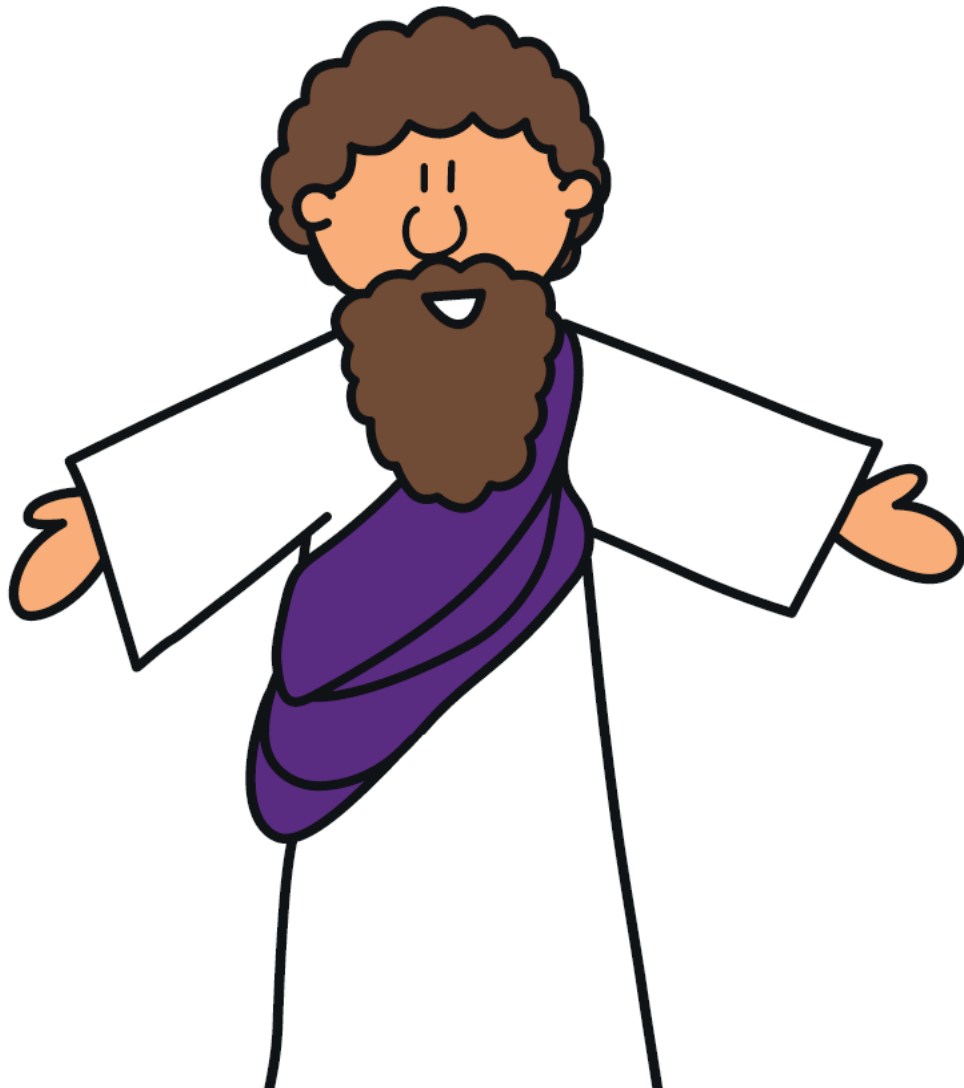


God's Promise and the Passover
